





Workers' Remittances (Monthly in Million USD)




Balance of Payments (Monthly in Million USD)












MoM% Change in Prices






# Electricity generation by type GWh (yearly)





## WHY DON'T JOBSEEKERS SEARCH MORE? **BARRIERS AND RETURNS TO SEARCH ON A JOB-MATCHING PLATFORM IN PAKISTAN**

The International Growth Centre (IGC) worked on a working paper that consisted of designing and implementing experiments on low-cost job search and matching platform, Job Talash, to understand the barriers that job seekers face in the search process and the returns to additional job search. The Labour Force Survey (LFS) of 2018-19 showed that around 50% of the individuals who are of working age and available to work in Pakistan are not engaged in any job search activity. This raises the question of low-cost ways for job search and whether this would lead to additional outcomes. In this analysis, using the platform "Talash", employers are prompted every month to list any new vacancies and match jobseekers to these. Using this system, a wide range of data is collected on the market both on the supply and the demand side of employment. IGC used a randomized control trial (RCT) to study the simple phone call initiation treatment and how it influenced job search for jobseekers that are enrolled in this platform.

The findings emphasized the impact of reducing the psychological costs of applying for jobs on the outcome of job searches. The results suggest that other policies designed to increase job search should consider ways to reduce the psychological costs of initiating applications. Job search or transport subsidy programmes could link payments more tightly to specific applications and caseworkers who deliver job search assistance can target their assistance to the stage of initiating job applications. # **UNPACKING PAKISTAN'S POVERTY**

Widespread poverty has plagued Pakistan for decades. In 2022, 21.9% of the population was reported to be living below the National Poverty Line. ## **NAVIGATION CLIMATE GOVERNANCE**


