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




Exports (Monthly in Million USD)

Balance of Trade (Monthly in Million USD)




Monthly Quantum Index of Manufacturing


Forex Reserves (Month-End Levels in Million USD)




Balance of Payments (Monthly in Million USD)






Exchange Rate (Monthly Average in PKR)

MoM % Change in Prices




YoY % Change in Prices



Overseas Remittances and Dutch Disease in Pakistan

Behavioral Insights & Technology for Revenue Collection: Lessons and Options

The Consortium for Development Policy Research (CDPR), Sustainable Energy and Economic Development (SEED) and the International Growth Center (IGC), hosted a workshop on Behavioral Insights & Technology for Revenue Collection: Lessons and Options, funded by UKAID. This note is based on the discussion and ideas presented in the workshop.

The focus was to explore mechanisms for provincial governments to utilize behavioral insights on tax administration and willingness to pay, to boost revenues and create a fiscal space for responsible investment in development.

Despite the devolution of revenue collection responsibilities to provinces following the 18th Constitutional Amendment, provinces continue to face significant hurdles in generating their own resources. There is a high reliance on federal transfers and provinces are not yet self-sufficient enough to meet their own expenditure needs. Thus, by leveraging technology and behavioral insights, governments can enhance tax administration, empower local governments, and promote economic growth.

The note also draws on the successful behavioral insights initiatives led by provinces to enhance interprovincial learning and offers policy recommendations to address the challenges hindering provincial revenue mobilization and administration in Pakistan.

Exploring the Unmet Need for Family Planning




