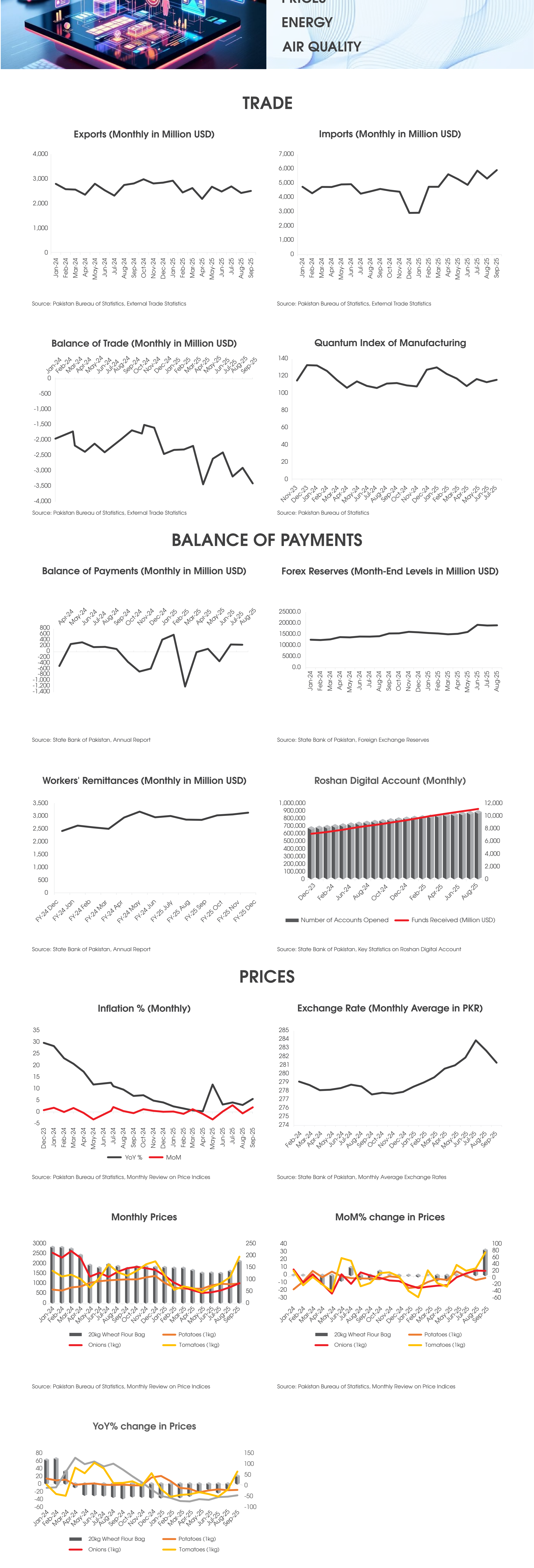

Pakistan's Air Pollution Crisis: A Call for Sustained Action

Pakistan faces one of the world's worst air pollution crises, with cities like Lahore recording hazardous PM2.5 levels year-round. Despite decades of environmental legislation, weak enforcement and fragmented institutions have left citizens exposed to toxic air that shortens life expectancy by up to 7.5 years in some regions. The issue is not seasonal but systemic, rooted in poor urban planning, unchecked vehicular emissions, industrial inefficiency and unsustainable agricultural practices. This article explores the structural causes of Pakistan's air pollution and argues that while short-term "band-aid" measures such as school closures or artificial rain offer little relief, the path to cleaner air lies in long-term, cross-sectoral reforms. Strengthening environmental institutions, enforcing emission standards, incentivizing cleaner transport and farming technologies and mobilizing civil society are all crucial steps.

Meritocracy in a Bureaucracy

In a system often associated with limited transparency and entrenched patronage, new research by Shan Aman Rana offers a surprising finding: discretion in Pakistan's bureaucracy can, under certain conditions, promote meritocracy. Focusing on the Pakistan Administrative Service (PAS), one of the country's most influential civil service cadres, the study uses hand-collected data on officers' careers, tax performance and professional networks to examine how promotions are determined.

The results show that senior bureaucrats are more likely to promote high-performing juniors based on ability rather than personal ties even in a high-corruption environment. The paper identifies specific institutional and incentive conditions that make merit-based promotions more likely, suggesting that well-structured discretion rather than rigid rules alone can strengthen governance and improve outcomes in developing-country bureaucracies.
